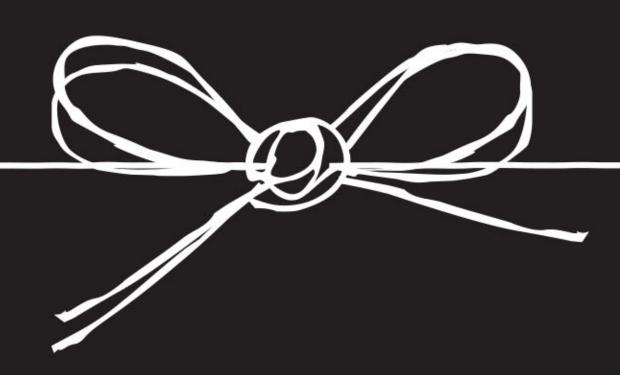
This is the gaze that can bring an authentic development. And the point is are we able to carry this gaze through what we do, through our projects?

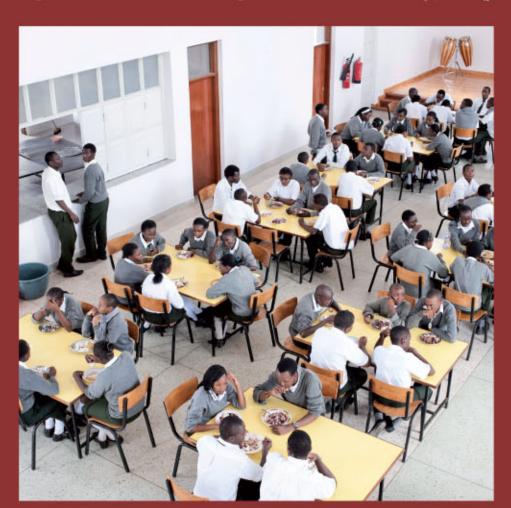

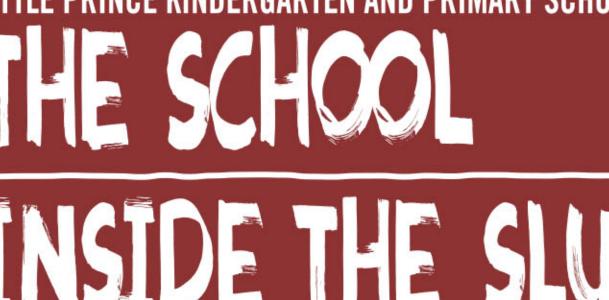

AVSI has been working in Kenya since 1986, in the areas of education, professional training, and career coaching focusing on vulnerable and at-risk children and youth, and their families. In long-term partnership with local community organizations and nonprofit institutions, AVSI implements projects that foster quality of education through teacher and staff training and accompaniment, state-of the-art facilities, labs and diverse after-school programs. AVSI helped to start the mentioned schools and continues to assist in their development, leveraging funding from a wide range of international supporters. In particular, the distance sponsorship program launched by AVSI in 1995 and supported also by **AVAID** (the Swiss partner in the AVSI network) allows almost 3,000 disadvantaged children to receive a good education, health care and nutrition.

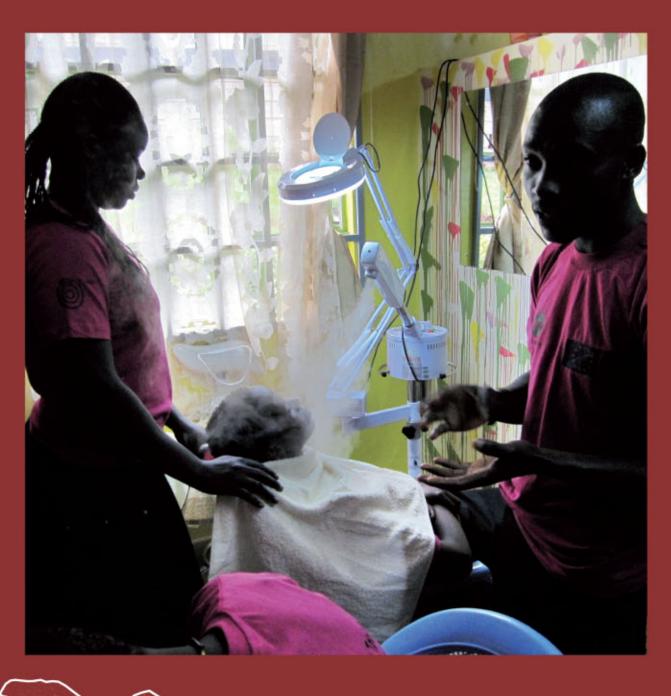

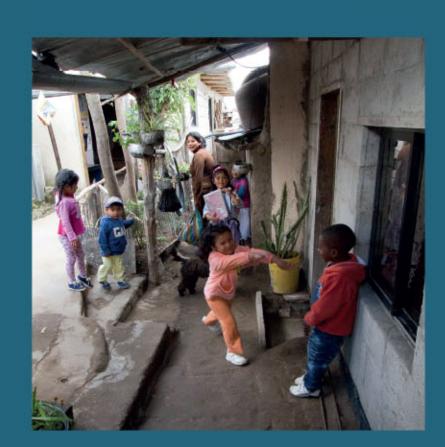

A CAZE THAT

GENERATES DEVELOPMENT

PELCA - PRE-SCHOOL AT HOME

400 mothers and 500 children

Program initiated in Ecuador by Father Dario Maggi in the rural areas of Manabí (Portoviejo) in 2000

Since 2004, the method was adjusted to the needs of working mothers of urban slum areas outside the capital of Quito.

Pre-school age children are educated at home: the family is the first place of education and the home is the most suitable place for this unique role of the mother to be played out. Every two weeks the MOTHERS and their children have an exchange and training session with the Family **EDUCATOR**.

Women rediscover THEIR VALUE as mothers and educators and become the first protagonists of change in their families and in their communities.

"To discover the desire for fulfillment and happiness we hold within, it is necessary to find a company, someone that looks at you. This gaze is what introduces the first change, the first true development".

CREN (Center for Recuperation and Education in Nutrition) From 1993 operates to **FIGHT AND PREVENT CHILD MALNUTRITION** in **SÃO PAULO**, the richest city of Brazil

It was founded with the help of AVSI and with the contribution of the ITALIAN MINISTRY OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS

During these years, it has helped MORE THAN 100,000 PEOPLE, and managed more than 280,000 CASES in the areas of HEALTH, EDUCATION AND SOCIAL WELFARE

THE THREE UNITS OF CREN can host up to 6,843 CHILDREN every year: 143 in Day Hospital, 1,700 in the clinics and 5,000 in the community

With 95 employees and 40 volunteers, it operates in partnership with the **MUNICIPALITY OF SÃO PAULO**, which provides for 87% of running costs. The remaining contributions come from **AVSI'S DISTANCE SPONSORSHIP** projects

CREN was partner of the FOME ZERO (ZERO HUNGER) program created by former president LULA, and received many ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS from the PRIVATE SECTOR

"A very important aspect is the sense of guilt felt by the mothers of those malnourished children. Facing malnutrition means embracing those mothers: we are together; you're not alone anymore. The first step to take to head a malnourished child is to embrace their family as much as possible".

THE LAST MILE

"The challenge of development is about allowing the person to latch on to services that match the real needs of the new peoples". It's what we call The Last Mile an essential bridge on the gap between the person and the infrastructure.



AVSI FOUNDATION

is an international not-for-profit, non-governmental organization (NGO) founded in Italy in 1972. Its mission is to promote the dignity of the person through development cooperation activities, with special attention to education, according to the social teaching on the catholic church.

AVSI is involved in **136 cooperation projects** in **30 developing countries** throughout Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean, Eastern Europe, Middle East and Asia. In 2014 **28,531 children** and adolescents have been included in the **distance support program**.



GUIDING VALUES the 5 points of AVSI's method

CENTRALITY OF THE PERSON. The person is seen as a unique being in his or her fundamental relationships, family and society. The person cannot be reduced to a social category or a limitation such as poverty, disease or disability.

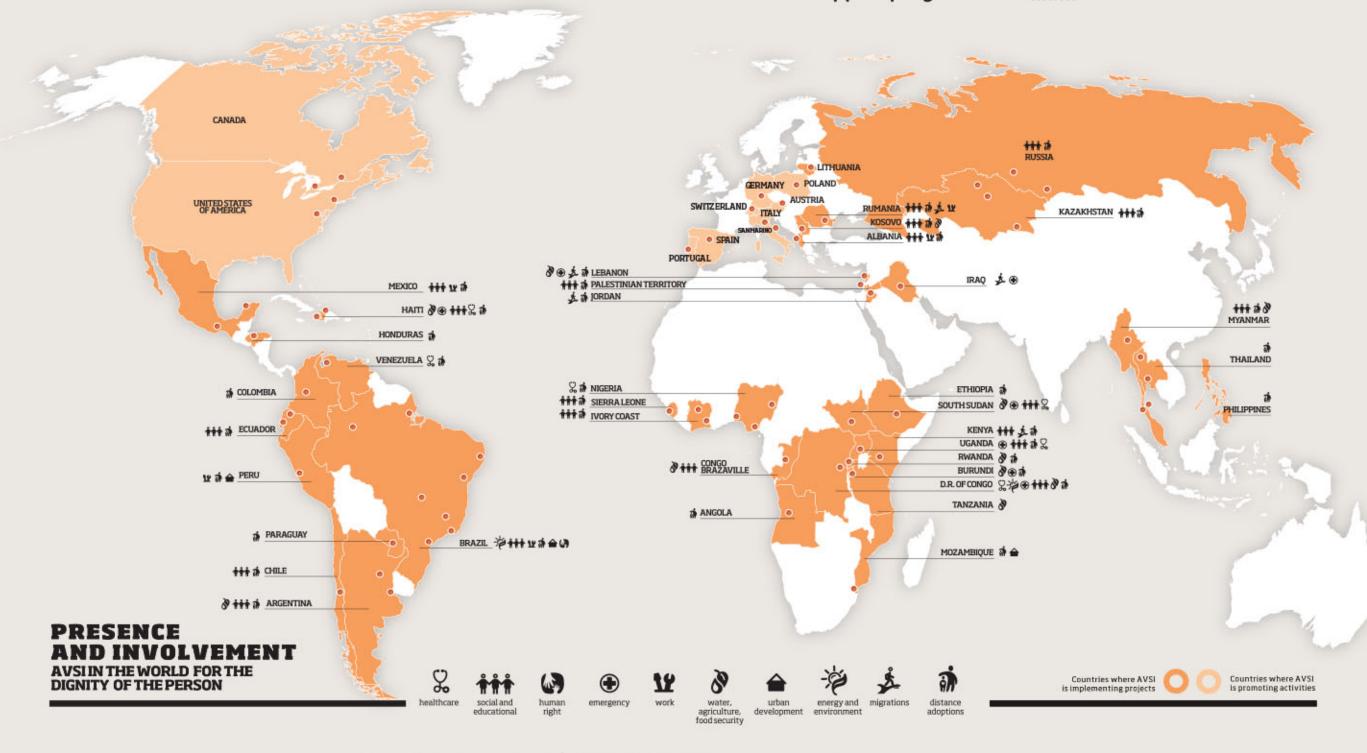
STARTING FROM THE POSITIVE. Every person and every community represents a potential resource, regardless of their vulnerability. Valuing and strengthening all that has been made by people. Helping people to understand their own value and dignity.

DOING WITH. Starting from a relationship WITH the people to whom the project is directed and building WITH them on the basis of their development path.

DEVELOPMENT OF CIVIL SOCIETY AND SUBSIDIARITY.

Development projects must favor associations, ackowledgment and must value the establishment of intermediate bodies along with responsible and engaged social fabric.

PARTNERSHIP. Promotion of partnerships with all the actors in the field in order to favor synergies and optimize available resources.
